## Adrenaline rush

Adam Taliaferro will feel it when he leads Penn State out of the tunnel against Miami.

At first, staring up at a dreary September sky and the teary face of Joe Paterno, Adam Taliaferro couldn't move.

At last, with Saturday night's triumphant return to the football field upon him, it is virtually impossible for Penn State's human pep rally to hold still.

"The excitement that I felt last year the first time I ran out of the tunnel, I want to get that



Incredibly, that wave of adrenaline in the stadium tunnel is the only sensation he has yet to regain since a devastating injury at Ohio State on Sept. 23. Taliaferro's fifth cervical vertebra was crushed while making a tackle, raising the dark curtain of paralysis, but his spinal column was bruised and not severed, offering at least a slim hope that the barrier might some day come down.

"When I woke up in the hospital, I realized it was pretty bad," Taliaferro said earlier this week, "but my parents and doctors never told me there was a chance I might not walk again."

In a way, this whole story is about chance, about opportunities lost and gained for no conceivable reason. In Taliaferro's case, a promising college football career as a freshman cor-

#### Taliaferro returns in storybook fashion

he scoreboard flashed the word "BE-All in plain, white capital letters, but

ground of blue.

Moments later, Adam Taliaferro, the Penn State defensive back felled and paralyzed for a month by a hit in last year's Ohio State game, bounced out of the tunnel at Beaver Stadium to waves of roars from 108,000 fans on hand for the Nittany Lions' season opener against Miami.


As flashbulbs winked by the thousands, Taliaferro bounded up and down on legs that once could not move, waved to the crowd with arms

that once were limp.

Before the entrance, a 30-second short was shown on the jumbo screen atop the south stadium addition, showing Taliaferro grimacing as he endured therapy last winter. After the grimace, came a smile.

Obviously, he believed.


# Authors describe Adam's miracle

dam Taliaferro should be an inspiration for anybody who's down and thinking about not getting up; reach down a little further and pull yourself up. That's exactly what he did.

A year ago, Taliaferro seem to have it all: intelligence, an easy-going personality, and great athletic talent. But the Penn State freshman cornerback, paralyzed after tackling an Ohio State running

However, he has defied the odds and can not only walk, but also run. That was evident when he led Penn State's football team out of the tunnel in the Nittany Lions' first home game, against Miami. In fact, that was the only bright spot of the day. The Lions were clobbered by the Hurricanes.

Miracle in the Making: The Adam Taliaferro Story (Triumph Books, \$16.95) written by Sam Carchidi Philadelphia Inquirer sportswriter, and Scott Brown Florida Today sportswriter, highlights Taliaferro's promising start as a National Honor Society student and star athlete at South Jersey's Eastern High, his introduction to college life, devastating sports injury, grueling rehab, and imate return to Penn State as young man with big dreams.

As much about the power of family and community love as it is about Taliaferro's triumph over extreme odds, the book hails his parents (Andre and Addie Taliaferro), who found themselves raising a promising athlete in the shadow of celebrity and facing potential tragedy.

The book credits Thomas Jefferson Hospital and Magee Rehabilitation Hospital for their great work with Taliaferro.

Sports celebrities who visited

him at Magee included Kansas City Chiefs' head coach Dick Vermeil, former Sixers' forward Tyrone Hill, Pat Croce, ex-Sixers' backup center Todd MacCulloch, Sixers' rookie guard Craig "Speedy" Claxton, former Flyers' goalie Bernie Parent, Phillies' pitcher Robert Person, and Eagles' quarterback Donovan McNabb.

He received a moving letter from Christopher Reeve, who played Superman. Reeve became a quadriplegic following a 1995 horse-riding accident.

The book is laced with a number of photos, including one

of Taliaferro with Bill Cosby during a Temple game at the Liacouras Center.

Although Taliaferro will never play football again, he's touched a lot of people.
